AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO REDUCE THE PUBLIC SAFETY CASH ACCOUNT AND MAKE CERTAIN ALLOCATIONS AS INTENDED WITH PUBLIC SAFETY DOLLARS RELATING TO POLICE EXPENDITURES

WHEREAS, the City of Berkeley has determined that Prop P is a vital initiative to provide law enforcement with the manpower and resources necessary to keep themselves and our residents safe. The proceeds from the one-half of one-percent sales is wholly earmarked for law enforcement needs; and

WHEREAS, under RSMo 67.547, the city shall receive approximately \$450,000 to be used for the Police Department hiring, equipment, training, and vehicles.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BERKELEY, MISSOURI, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The City Manager comes now with the appropriate allocations to reduce the Public Safety Cash Account.

- a. Public Safety Electronic Display Marquee Signs
- b. Purchase of one vehicle
- c. Hiring of Police Officers, Detective, and Captain; and, setting salaries as needed

Section 2. The Public Safety Account shall bear no more than ten percent (10%) of the annual distribution.

Section 3. This Ordinance is in addition to all other ordinances on the subject and shall be construed therewith excepting as to that part in direct conflict with any other ordinance, and in the event of such conflict, the provisions hereof shall govern.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval.





LAW ENFORCEMENT SALES TAX CALCULATIONS UNDER RSMo. 67.547

10/19/2016

Under RSMo. 67.547, five-eighths of the sales tax is distributed to cities, towns, villages and the unincorporated area of the county on the ratio that the population of each bears to the total population of the county. A half-cent countywide sales tax generates approximately \$80 million.

Five-Eighths (5/8) Distribution Calculation 0.625

Half-Cent Sales Tax = \$80,000,000 x 0.625 = \$50,000,000
