## FROM THE MAYOR'S DESK

### Dear Residents:

*Congratulations:* to Gary Wentland and the Wentland's Funeral Home for reaching their 60th year anniversary—and Wentland's Monuments for reaching their 35th year anniversary; and also to the North Collins Central School District for graduating 98% of their students in 2017! North Collins tied Amherst and Williamsville East with the highest local scores.

*Welcome Aboard!* The Village has hired a part-time employee. Bill Hirsch, a village resident, will work in the Public Works Department for 19 hours per week. Bill's first day on the job was February 5th. The Public Works Department now consists of three full-time and one part-time worker. Welcome aboard, Bill!

*Christmas Celebration at Village Park and Gazebo:* The Town, with cooperation from the Village, made a huge success of the holiday event, which was a yearly event many years ago. Thanks to Lynn, our Town Clerk; Crystal, our Town Bookkeeper; North Collins Wesleyan Church; the Village of North Collins DPW; Erie County Sheriffs; the North Collins Emergency Squad; the Village Police; and the Lawton, Langford, and North Collins Fire Companies. Without their help, this event couldn't have been carried out. As part of this event, the Village held a Gingerbread House Building event at our Village Hall with the assistance of Buffalo's Explore and More Museum. We had nearly a full house with more than 20 children building houses and their parents and families taking pictures and helping out. Thanks to Village Trustee Corinne Leone, who came up with the idea and then set up the whole program.

Hamburg Camp Auto Sales at 10807 Main Street has offered the Village Police free oil changes when our two police cars need them. We thank them for their generous offer in helping out the Village.

*Reading Water Meters:* With our automated system, one worker can read 550 meters in 32 minutes! Before installing this system, it took two men at least four days to read meters and write the reading in four meter books and those readings had to be manually entered into the computer for the billing. This system is proving to be much more accurate and is saving time and money for the Village.

I once again have been appointed to the Erie County Sewer Board District 2 by Erie County Executive Mark Poloncarz. I have also been chosen as Treasurer for the Southtowns Community Enhancement Coalition. These are a couple of ways to improve and promote our village.

I would like to extend my thanks and best wishes to two of our neighboring Town Supervisors who did not choose to run this year: Lenny Pero of the Town of Brant and Dave Tessmer of the Town of Collins. They were always ready to give our Village a helping hand whenever we needed it and they were always there to answer my questions and concerns. They will be missed.

*4th of July Celebration:* The Town and Village of North Collins are working with members of our community to bring back the Independence Day Celebration. This was an annual event that was held at Fricano Town Park many years ago. Brandi LoBianco and her Community Action committee came up with the idea and now a sub-committee has been formed to coordinate this specific event. The event will happen June 30th, 2018 and will include fireworks, music, refreshments, children's games, and much more!

*Going Bald for Bucks:* This will be North Collins Central School's 16th year hosting this event. It's a fundraiser where 100% of charitable donations are earmarked for Roswell Park Cancer Institute. Students, staff, faculty, and community members volunteer to shave their head or cut their hair in return for donations. North Collins Central is challenging us to support our students by helping raise money for this worthy cause. This event was started by former Village Trustee, Tony George, in recognition of his sister Cathy who died of cancer at a very young age. (Donations can be dropped off during school on or before March 21st.)

*Eagle Energy Day:* Eagle Energy Day is an initiative of our school district where students complete service projects in the community, working together to make North Collins a better place to live, work, and play. **Friday, May 11** students will be organized to plant, clean, paint and refurbish our community. Do you have a project that might benefit from the help of some of our hard-working volunteers? You supply the materials, and the school supplies the manpower! Complete the Eagle Energy Project form available in the High School Office and submit it to Mrs. Lisa Brosnick at the high school. (The Village office also has copies of this form.)

*End of year report:* This has been a good, solid year for the Village. Major work was completed in our Fire Hall: New doors were installed in the front, bathroom and shower were installed in the engine room, the upstairs meeting room had a new floor and paneling installed. The DPW building had a new heating system installed, put on a new roof, insulated the building, installed an emergency generator. Well #5 was resurged and is producing bountifully. The Village meeting room has new chairs and tables. Work has begun on the gazebo in Dr. Joy Memorial Park. The Village Park had new landscaping completed in the front beds. The Village purchased a much-needed excavator. The DPW slurry sealed, stoned, and chipped a number of streets (Kimble, Walnut, Gurney, Eagle, Pine, and Franklin). Two more park benches were purchased and will be installed this spring. Homes have been selling at a record pace. In the Village office, we began accepting credit and debit cards for tax and water payments; built an electronic data base of all Village births and deaths (since 1913); typed and posted online all Zoning Board of Appeals minutes (since 1963); completed the updated Comprehensive Plan for the Village; and are continuing to research and make available regional resources to assist village residents.
