

| 18 |   | DEPUTY MAYOR SPADA: Thank you, Mr.                        |
| 19 |   | Coursey. Ms. Cronin, roll call.                           |

| 3  | present? Good evening, sir.                               |
| 4  | MR. MIKE O'MALLEY: Good evening. My name                  |
| 5  | is Mike O'Malley. I'm the Kavra Projects manager, the     |
| 6  | Department of Community Services for the town. With me    |
| 7  | here this evening to present the application to you is    |
| 8  | Bruce Tuthill. He's the principle in the architectural    |
| 9  | firm of Tuthill and Wells, who designed the addition.     |
| 10 | Also here, if we need her to answer questions, is Pat     |
| 11 | Holloway, the library director.                           |
| 12 | Before I turn over to Bruce I just want to                |
| 13 | focus that this application is changes to the application |
| 14 | as previously approved. And the changes as we go through  |
| 15 | them, you'll see they're rather minor in terms of a small |
| 16 | increase in the footprint of the building and some minor  |
| 17 | addition of interior square footage to what was           |
| 18 | previously approved.                                      |
| 19 | And with that I'll ask Bruce Tuthill to                   |
| 20 | come up and walk you through the particulars of the       |
| 21 | changes that we're looking at.                            |
| 22 | DEPUTY MAYOR SPADA: Thank you.                            |
| 23 | MR. BRUCE TUTHILL: Good evening. Can you                  |
| 24 | folks all see this? The audience can't, but okay.         |

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Thank you. My name is Bruce Tuthill from Tuthill and Wells Architects. We've been working on the library for quite a while now. And since the original application, which was two years ago, with the Blue Back application we've spent a lot of time internally looking at the building, trying to improve it.

Pat Holloway, the Director, has taken the lead and gotten or worked with the state following state guidelines. We've developed a plan now and tweaked it a bit to where we have a plan that meets the state requirements for 20 years, a 20-year growth period. And by doing that we also received a grant of a half a million dollars from the state.

We've also made -- applied for another grant for the handicapped access to the upper floor, the administration -- administrative floor. It was never, quote, handicap accessible. It had an elevator, but it didn't comply with the code. So that change also has made the building now a 100 percent handicap accessible. And another grant was issued for that. So over the past two years Pat has found or the town has found another 850,000 dollars to go into the project, which is really a great move on everybody's part.

The changes that we had to make internally

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to comply with the state regulations were to -- it was mainly the capacity of the stacks. They wanted 20-year growth plan and we were a little bit short. So if you picture the library now there is a mezzanine when you walk onto the main floor. The addition to the north just had that mezzanine extended a short distance. What we've done is extend the mezzanine around to the north wall now. And that in effect has changed the footprint a bit. On the outside, just to orientate you, South Main Street, Building A here, the present library. There is one addition here that will get us down to Webster Square, the lower level at Ishum. The other addition is on the north. There was a recess we had put into the building initially as an architectural element really just to break up this long wall from the outside. The church looks at the wall and we didn't want to have it a massive wall. So we had a recess just to relieve the size of it. And it was eight feet deep. To make this change internally and get more book stacks in we've reduced that by six feet. So now -- there still is a reveal there, it's two feet deep, and it's gained about a 130 square feet of floor footprint to the building. The yellow area represents

what's increased. And that's carried up through the building on the three floors.

Internally, on the -- let me start up top and work down. This is the mezzanine level. Originally the application -- this is the mezzanine we have now. We had extended it just over in this part. To increase the book capacity we've filled in this piece of floor inside. It's not really a room, it's just -- the mezzanine has been carried around here. So when you come in what you see here now you'll see this way.

small meeting room. There was really -- the guidelines call for small meeting rooms for a lot of variety of different types of programs. And we've had this space up in the mezzanine level so we've added that here. Those two additions -- this one doesn't affect the outside at all. But this one -- this is where that nitch was in the building. It's carried -- carried down through the main level of the library the same as we had -- this is the piece, we've increased it. It's a 129 square feet. And on the lower level, which is the children's level, another piece that's increased here.

And then along with that, as we changed and modified things we tweaked the exterior elevations as far as window locations go. So it's basically the same — it's the same concept as we had before with some of this a little more organized to match the rooms inside.

We've taken a — on the Webster Square or Blue Back — I'm not sure what it's called, Plaza down here, we had a gable roof to say entrance. Well, we've changed that to just — just a simple freeze band like on the front of the existing building. It allows us more light, more window space into the building.

And on the north side, it's hard to represent, but this is the nitch that goes into the building to get a shadow line here. These are pretty much the same as they were.

That's it. That's in a nutshell, that's what we did. But it's a much improved plan internally. Pat has worked very hard to get the maximum public space out of the existing building. So we've taken a lot of staff areas off the main floor and put them up on different levels. But made the public space the maximum space on the main — on both floors now.

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MS. HOLLOWAY: Actually, we had a great conversation this morning with Town Manager and the other managers from the different departments. We're all set with WiFi in all three areas -- in all three of the branches at this point. We are ready willing and able to connect to any networks that happen to just appear for us along the line. Wymax would be great to go throughout the town and we could connect up to that. At this point we have -- we'll have 64 public access computers in the main building. That's probably an addition of I would say 30 over what we have now. But we also have wireless access throughout the building or we will when we finish. So that you can open up your laptop anywhere in the building, use your PDA or whatever you have that you can get Internet access. So that the whole building will be wired for that. We're also connected into the CEN, which is the Connecticut Educational Network, which provides access for public libraries and schools throughout the state for free access on fiber. So we are -- we are in good shape for moving ahead in that area. MS. CARPENTER: A follow up question, the 64 computers is that in the adult library, the children's

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MS. HOLLOWAY: It's adult, children and the teen's room. So in all of those areas, yes. We're putting actually under the mezzanine portion here we're putting in a new computer lab so we'll be able to actually teach software programs, Internet access, that type of thing to a classroom of 20, but while that classroom is not being used for classes it will be open for the public to just come in and use those computers. MS. CARPENTER: A follow up question, please. The next question has to do with of that additional square footage -- I know they spoke about adding to the stacks for storage area. How much of that -- what percentage is going to be for storage and how much is that space going to be used so that -- for patrons that visit the library? MS. HOLLOWAY: I have a theory about storage and it is that it's not kind of space that I want to pay 300 dollars a foot for. So we don't have much storage space in the building at this point. Everything that we have in our collection has to earn its space. We're not going to store it if you can't use it. So basically what we've done, additionally, we've put -- we put meeting room space on the bottom floor. We've taken out a lot of the storage areas that we were actually

MS. HOLLOWAY: Well, we've actually held some focus groups along the way to talk to the people in the community to find out what it is that they're looking for, particularly with parents of young children to ask them what, you know, what are they missing. What do they feel they're missing in terms of the library.

And basically the feedback that we've gotten is the library seems to have a wonderful collection that meets the needs that people have. They have a great staff, which is able to help people use that. The problem is that there is no place to sit down when you come in. There is just simply not enough room in the building as well as that there is not enough room within the stack areas for you to move freely around. You're always -- you know, you're always inching along the edge of the stacks. They're not wide enough apart.

So Bruce and I have worked very hard to put the stacks on the center of six feel apart so that they're about a foot into that. So we've got four feet to move between them. That means that people can move around more easily in the stack areas. We've put some places that people can sit. We've actually -- I've forgotten the exact number of seats, but we've added at least a 100 seats in the building in different areas either around

| 4  | have been missing. They can come in. They can get their   |
| 5  | things, but there is not a lot of places to sit down and  |

| 7  | One of the things that we're looking                      |
| 8  | forward to doing more of and the community is being       |
| 9  | something that some people call a third place, a          |
| 10 | community center so that people can come in. They can     |
| 11 | bring the whole family. Everybody can find something to   |
| 12 | do within the building. And can kind of spread out and    |
| 13 | learn, enjoy all the things that we have. We have taken   |
| 14 | seriously our role as the community key point on the      |
| 15 | whole Blue Black development area. So that there are lots |
| 16 | of places people can live there, people can shop there.   |
| 17 | But the one place that everybody has a place to go to     |
| 18 | there is at the library and that's basically been our     |
| 19 | theory.   |
