RESOLUTION NO. 2012-9

A RESOLUTION OF ADOPTION FOR AN
ACT 537 OFFICIAL SEWAGE FACILITIES PLAN SPECIAL STUDY

WHEREAS, Section 5 of the Act of January 24, 1966, P.L. 1535, No. 537 known as the "Pennsylvania Sewage Facilities Act", as amended, and the Rules and Regulations of the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection ("the Department") adopted thereunder, Chapter 71 of Title 25 of the Pennsylvania Code, requires municipalities to adopt an Official Sewage Facilities Plan providing for sewage facilities adequate to prevent contamination of waters and/or environmental health hazards with sewage wastes, and to revise said plan whenever it is necessary to meet the sewage disposal needs of the municipality; and

WHEREAS, the URS Corporation has prepared an Official Sewage Facilities Plan Special Study ("the Plan") which provides for the sewage needs of existing residences served by on-lot sewage systems in Westtown Township; and

WHEREAS, selected alternatives of the Plan are: 1) Continued public sewerage service for all properties so served at this time; 2) Continued use of on-lot sewage systems for all properties so served at this time; and 3) All existing and future on-lot sewage systems will be subject to an on-lot sewage management program which requires system inspections and pumping at regular intervals.


NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that Westtown Township has found the Plan adequate for the wastewater disposal and management needs of the municipality and hereby adopts the Plan known as the Westtown Township Official Sewage Facilities Plan Special Study: Sewage Needs of Existing Residences, dated September 2012 as a revision to the Official Plan of the municipality. The Westtown Township Board of Supervisors hereby assures the Department of the proper and timely implementation of said Plan as set forth herein.
